Mother Teresa (26th August 1910 – 5th September 1997)

She was a great teacher, not through classrooms and books, but through her life and actions. She taught the world the values of love, and service to humanity. By dedicating her life to the sick, and abandoned, she showed that true greatness lies in selfless giving. Mother Teresa received several honours, including the 1962 Ramon Magsaysay Peace Prize and the 1979 Nobel Peace Prize. Mother Teresa said, "By blood, I am Albanian, by citizenship, an Indian. by faith, I am a Catholic nun. As to my calling, I belong to the world. As to my heart, I belong entirely to the Heart of Jesus. She was the preacher of Love and Compassion.



Dr. Sarvapalli Radha krishnan (5th September 1888 – 17th April 1975)

One of India's most revered thinkers and leaders, he served as the second President of India. He stressed on the importance of moral and ethical values in education and life. Awards like the Bharat Ratna recognized his outstanding contributions to the nation. His legacy, celebrated on Teacher's Day is a testament to his indelible mark on Indian education and philosophy. Some of his famous quotes are 'Books are the means by which we build bridges between cultures.' 'When we think we know we cease to learn.' 'It takes centuries to make a little history, it takes centuries of history to make a tradition.'



Padma Vibhushan Pandit Chhannulal Mishra (3rd August 1936 - 2nd October 2025)

Pandit Chhannulal Mishra was a renowned Hindustani classical vocalist and a leading exponent of the Banaras Gharana, known for his mastery of forms like Khayal and Thumri. He was a recipient of the Padma Vibhushan (2020), and Padma Bhushan (2010) and is remembered for his significant contributions to Indian classical and devotional music. He received his initial musical training from his father, Badri Prasad Mishra, and further honed his skills under Ustad Abdul Ghani Khan of the Kirana Gharana. He primarily played the Swarmandal. The swarmandal, surmandal, or Indian harp, originating from india, most commonly used as an accompanying instrument for vocal Indian classical music.

Where Curiosity Meets Discovery




- A teaspoon of a neutron star weighs about 6 billion tons. The density is unimaginable - it's like squeezing all of Mount Everest into a sugar cube.




